When you think of a witch, you probably picture an image of an old and stereotypically ugly woman cackling on a broomstick or hovering above a cauldron. But if you examine all the many witches that have been a part of cinematic history since its inception, there's actually a huge variety to the archetype. From the three witches of Macbeth to the witch Bathsheba of The Conjuring, West has a very rich and fascinating history of witch hunts and supremacy. Shakespeare in one of his most popular tragedies Macbeth presented the three witches as figures not only of power but also of trickery, deception, and challenge. They are the "withered" and "wild" mysterious figures who destabilize the social, cultural, and political universe of the patriarchy and lead men to ruin and destruction. The movie that we will look at to understand the politics of the representation of witches on the screen is The Conjuring. The Conjuring is a 2013 American supernatural horror film directed by James Wan and written by Chad Hayes and Carey W. Hayes. This is one of the most popular movies in Hollywood centering on the alleged reallife exploits of Ed and Lorraine Warren, a married couple who investigated paranormal events.

The Conjuring which is set in 1971 revolves around a purportedly real-life witch Bathsheba Sherman. This movie is much feminist in its approach and presents both the witch and the female paranormal investigator Lorraine as equally powerful figures. The witch Bathsheba that constitutes the main antagonist is indeed a descendant of a Salem witch. In the movie, Bathsheba the witch who possesses mothers to kill children is a terrifying figure who has terrorized generations and is much daunted the Church as well. The Church actually plays an idle role in the movie. Even Ed's exorcism fails to suppress Bathsheba, the witch. This successfully shows why patriarchy stigmatizes witches, it's simply because they cannot control these powerful men and are scared of their power. Therefore, we may conclude that the idea of the witch is more of a social construct than anything real. It just reflects the fear of patriarchy from the powerful women.

A phantom ship, also known as a ghost ship, is a vessel with no living crew aboard. The term is sometimes used for ships that have been found after breaking loose of their ropes and becoming carried away by the wind or the waves. The Flying Dutchman or De Vliegende Hollander is a legendary ghost ship, allegedly never able to make port. but doomed to sail the seven seas forever. Reported sightings in the 19th and 20th centuries claimed that the ship glowed with a ghostly light.




A well-known sighting was by Prince George of Wales, the future King George V. The 1797-98 poem by Samuel Taylor Coleridge, The Rime of the Ancient Mariner, contains a similar account of a ghost ship, which may have been influenced by the tale of the Flying Dutchman. Mary Celeste was an American merchant brigantine discovered adrift and deserted in the Atlantic Ocean on December 4, 1872. She had left New York City for Genoa on November 7 and was still amply provisioned when found. None of those who had been on board were ever seen or heard from again. A new captain, Gilman C. Parker took charge in August 1884. Nevertheless, his professional reputation was ruined, and he died in poverty three months later. One of his co-defendants went mad, and another killed himself.




## **BOOK AWARDS IN 2022**








Joshua Cohen's novel The Netanyahus won the Pulitzer fiction prize, and Andrea Elliott's Invisible Child, won the general nonfiction award.

## Student Achievements




Dibyadarshan Das: He has authored two books 'Covering Cricket' and 'Love Tussle', along with several journalist stints on sports.
